### ART IN THE DETAILS

Art is everywhere underwater. It is in the way sun beams flitter about the blue water. It is in the patterned structure of a coral head. It is in the colorful design of an angelfish. It is in the peaks and valleys of white sand in the wave swept shallows. It is everywhere. Perhaps the greatest place to witness art underwater is in the smallest details.

As we dive we often get so distracted by big stuff that we miss the beautiful small things. A coral reef is made up of amazing colors, patterns and textures. As photographers, it is important to seek out these tiny features. Some of my favorite images are what I call texture shots. These are photos created with a macro lens. These photos are filled with small portions of larger subjects. These include things like a close up of a particularly colorful crinoid arm, a closeup of a fish's scales or fin, a closeup of fan coral polyps, a close shot down the oral siphon of a tunicate, the spiky texture of a sea star, or an unusual detail of an anemone.



If you attempt to shoot these tiny details I have a few tips. 1) Compose your shot to get most of the subject on the same focal plane. When shooting close macro images depth of field will be very limited, so it is important to shoot the subject so that it is parallel to the front of lens. Choosing to shoot a flatter portion of the subject will also help. 2) Shoot at a high f-stop. This will maximize depth of field which is important when shooting tiny macro subjects. 3) Pull your lights in close to your lens. Because you will be very close to the subject pulling the lights in will ensure the subject will not fall into the lightless area between your lights. This will also help you get more light on your subject allowing you to shoot at a higher f-stop (see tip 2 above). 4) Try to compose your shot so that the whole frame is filled with the pattern, color or texture you are trying to capture.





On your next dive trip look beyond the wide-angle scenes, beyond even macro subjects and seek out the tiny intricate details of the reef. These tiny structures that create the reef ecosystem can also create wonderful images.



# FGBNMS UPDATE

Last week NOAA published the Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) for the proposed expansion of the Flower Garden Banks National Marine Sanctuary and the EPA published a notice of availability for the FEIS in the Federal Register. Two steps remain. In no more than 30 days from now, NOAA will publish the final rule to expand our sanctuary. Once that happens Congress will have 45 days to review the rule. After that period expires, the rule becomes law. Fourteen new banks will be added to the sanctuary, three of which are within recreational dive depths: Sonnier Bank, Geyer Bank and Bright Bank. 
