In a world long ago before COVID, we were putting together our presentation for the Anilao Blackwater trip David Lenderman, Tom Collier, and I did in 2020. Just before we were to leave, Taal Volcano blew its top and ash was going everywhere. We were concerned about how it would affect our trip. A diver friend in Denver told me about her friends, Barry and Jody Cline, who were over in Puerto Galera. Maybe they would have some input. She put us into contact and Barry not only had advice, but he had photos and video of the ash cloud billowing about 40 miles north of where they got off the boat. I asked if we could use his pictures and video in our show and he was gracious enough to let us. That led to more conversation and ultimately Jody and Barry joined HUPS. They have been active ever since. They prepared a presentation for HUPS a couple of years ago and both are active on Zoom and in our photo contest.

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Jody and Barry Cline discovered diving a little later in life—in their 50s back in 2007, after raising their five kids. Their very first taste of scuba was on their one and only cruise. They tried to start certification there, but rough seas kept them from finishing the pool work. Luckily, two discovery dives were all it took to get them hooked!

Once they got home to Eugene, Oregon, they finished up their PADI certifications: Open Water, Advanced, Rescue, Wreck, and even the rare Habitat Diver — thanks to their volunteer work at the Oregon Coast Aquarium.

Barry quickly combined his love of diving with his passion for photography. A few years later, in 2016, Jody joined in after attending an underwater photography workshop in Anilao, Philippines—where pursued the artistic side of capturing the underwater world.

Since then, their adventures have taken them to the Philippines, Fiji, Roatán (Honduras), Bonaire, and Cozumel. Closer to home, they've braved the chilly waters of the Pacific Northwest (Brrr!)—diving the Oregon coast, Hood Canal, and the San Juan Islands in Washington, plus a couple of trips up to Nanaimo, Canada. They also explored the Channel Islands in California aboard the Conception.

In 2020, they became HUPS members and have enjoyed participating in the club on zoom and in person on a trip to Bonaire.

Jody and Barry moved from Oregon to Sun City, Arizona in 2021, where they continue to travel (to dive), enjoy photography, and share the incredible things they discover beneath the surface with others.



### 2025 Photo Contest Categories

January Green Vellow etc.)		Subject must be a single color or shade of color, such as: green moray eel, green parrotfish, soap fish, sharks, sponge, coral.		
February	Fish Portraits	1 or 2 fish (not critters), side on, angled views, or face-to the-camera shots are what we're looking for.		
March	Groupers, Sweetlips	Groupers typically have a stout body and large mouth, and can be quite large. Sweetlips also have large, fleshy lips.		
April	Long and thin - fish or critters	Any fish or critter that is characterized by long, thin lines.		
May	Pairs (2 of the same)	Two of the same critters or fish, similar in form, matched or associated.		
June	Things that Live in Sand or Muck	Fish or critters that live in sand or muck.		
July	Echinoderms (starfish, urchins, sea cucumbers, etc.)	Echinoderms usually have five-point radial symmetry, and include starfish, brittle stars, sea urchins, sand dollars, sea cucumbers, and crinoids.		
August	Silhouettes	In Silhouettes the outline and shape of the subject are what is important. A good silhouette should have almost no detail observable in the primary subject.		
September Juveniles of Any Species		A Juvenile can be anything that's not a mature adult, preferably fish or critters that are obviously still maturing. Such as: juvenile anglefish that have distinct markings or juvenile spotted drums that need to grow into their fins		
October Corals-Macro (hard or soft)		Coral a tiny soft-bodied animal that typically lives within a stony skeleton grouped in large colonies. The goal is individual polyps, not a reef composition.		
November	Reef scenes with diver(s)	Any kind of reef scene somewhere in the shot, and also must include at least one diver.		
December  Best of HUPS		NOVICE, INTERMEDIATE, ADVANCED, and CREATIVE contests: First place winners from each month's Novice, Intermediate and Advanced categories will be entered automatically for judging. The Creative category lets you enter anything you want as long as you do the photography and any special editing.		

### 2026 Photo Contest Categories

January Banded/Stripes		A fish or critter that has bands or stripes on their body. Detail: A pattern of parallel bands or lines on a contrasting background.		
February	Crustaceans (Shrimp, Lobsters, Crabs, etc.)	Just like it says - look it up in the book (crabs, shrimp, lobsters, barnacles, etc.). When in doubt, Wikipedia can help you out.		
March	Diagonal Composition	A diagonal composition is employed to arrange elements in an image based on a diagonal line.		
April	Gobies, Blennies, Jaw fish, Triple fins	Tiny guys that like to hug the reef, hide out in holes, or build their nests in the sand. If you aren't sure, look it up in your fish ID book.		
May	Fish with Spots or Polka Dots	A small round or roundish mark, differing in color or texture from the surface around it, such as boxfishes, coffer fishes, cowfishes and trunkfishes.		
June	Eels (morays, garden, etc.)	There are lots of eels out there. They are pretty easy to spot. Think "snakes with gills".		
July	Natural light	Use the sun for light (vs strobes), so lighting will be more even. Ideal for large subjects: large reefs, schools of fish, silhouettes, or large wrecks.		
August Odd-shaped bottom dwellers		If it's a bit odd looking and spends most of its life on or in the sand or reef, it probably qualifies. Infrequent-swimmers. Frogfish, crabs, flounder, scorpionfish, toadfish, batfish, lizardfish, crocodile fish		
September	Camouflage	Underwater camouflage is the set of methods of achieving crypsis—avoidance of observation—that allows otherwise visible aquatic organisms to remain unnoticed by other organisms such as predators or prey.		
October  Large swimmers (> 4 feet) - not people		A fish or critter that is "swimming" with a length > 4 feet, such as: grouper, tarpon, shark, sting ray, manta ray, dolphin, moray eel		
November Hawkfish, Drums, Triggerfish		This theme gives you up to 3 possible choices of fish families. If not sure, check your fish ID book.		
December	Best of HUPS	NOVICE, INTERMEDIATE, ADVANCED, and CREATIVE contests: First place winners from each month's Novice, Intermediate and Advanced categories will be entered automatically for judging. The Creative category lets you enter anything you want as long as you do the photography and any special editing.		

### 2027 Photo Contest Categories

January	Angelfish & Butterflyfish	Pomacanthidae & Chaetodontidae are platter-flat, colorful, and pretty. If you aren't sure, look it up in your fish ID book.		
February	Man-Made/Wrecks	Any large object (larger than a basketball) made by man that is on the bottom, such as: ships, planes, vehicles, etc. Avoid trash and debris.		
March	Turtles	Sea Turtles, any variety – one or more. Your choice. Our air-breathing aquatic reptile buddies with the ancient pedigree.		
April	Black & White (monochrome)	Mono-color images (black & white, sepia, blue- tone, etc.). Only shades of one color are allowed. Can be taken as a mono-color image straight out of the camera or edited down from full color.		
May	Flat fish	It needs to have a pronounced flat profile and be a FISH: flounder, angelfish, filefish, butterflyfish, sunfish, triggerfish, etc.		
June Macro - Smaller than an orange		The subject is smaller than an orange. Can be a portion of a larger subject (eyes, fins, etc.). Should be taken with a macro lens or one that focuses close. Don't just over-crop.		
July	Damselfish, Chromis, Hamlets, Basslets	A group of small fish generally 3 to 6 inches in length that have a perch like or oval profile. If you are not sure look in your fish id book.		
August	Cephalopods (octopi, squid, cuttlefish)	Cephalopods are a sub-group of the phylum Mollusca (i. e., mollusks). Limit your entries to: squid, cuttlefish, octopi, and nautilus. (Not snails, slugs, clams, nudibranchs.)		
September Hogfish, Wrasses, Parrotfish, Razor		This theme gives you up to 4 possible choices of fish families. If not sure, check your fish ID book.		
October	Sharks & Rays	Chondrichthyes or cartilaginous fishes are jawed fish with paired fins, paired nares, scales, two-chambered hearts, and skeletons made of cartilage rather than bone. The class is divided into two subclasses: Elasmobranchii (sharks, rays and skates) and Holocephali (chimaeras, sometimes called ghost sharks).		
November	Anemones & things that live in them	Just like it says. To qualify, an anemone must be in the shot. The "things" (clownfish, crabs, etc.) are optional.		
December	Best of HUPS  NOVICE, INTERMEDIATE, ADVANCED, and CREATIVE contests	First place winners from each month's Novice, Intermediate and Advanced categories will be entered automatically for judging. The Creative category: Enter anything you want as long as you do the photography and any special editing.

Composition is the arrangement of elements relative to each other and to the frame. Strong composition can make or break an image. If your images are technically correct—properly exposed and in focus—yet still feel like they're missing something, this workshop is for you! The workshop will cover how to compose a subject or scene to create pleasing, engaging images that make your subject stand out. Sometimes the smallest adjustments in composition can dramatically change an image's impact.

In addition to general composition techniques, David will share specific tips for some of his favorite subjects, including sharks, eels, seahorses, rays, reef fish, and reef scenes. The tips you take away from this workshop can be applied to any type of photography and to any camera. By attending this workshop, you'll take a major step toward moving from snapshots to creating art.

Our workshop leader, David Lenderman, is an accomplished underwater photographer and wonderful presenter. Over his 25 plus years of HUPS Membership he has led numerous educational workshops and given many outstanding presentations on far flung dive destinations.

# Dealing with Droplets when Shooting Split Shots

Split shots, sometimes called "over-unders," refer to photos where half of the frame is underwater and half of it above water. This presents a variety of special challenges for the photographer. Dynamic range and lighting can all be worked around - but water droplets are an ever-present pain.

#### The Problem with Water Droplets

You can take a clear image through a wire fence, yet a small droplet of water on your dome in the wrong spot can totally ruin an otherwise perfect split shot. We're typically shooting at relatively small apertures – F8 and smaller – to get enough depth of field for both the wet and dry portions of frame in focus at the same time. So a big drop of water on the front of your dome will a fuzzy blob in your photo.

Dome ports for underwater photography typically come in a variety of diameters, typically between 4 and 10 inches. Shooting with a larger diameter dome will help you to control the water line and will also cause water droplets to be smaller and less apparent in your image. Droplets will also be less prominent in your frame when shooting at wider focal lengths. Even in the calmest seas or a pool, small droplets of water are attracted like magnets to your port. They will be there regardless of what you do. Minimizing the quantity and size of these blobs is the first place to start.



The best solution, if you are able, is to not let your dome get wet in the first place and carefully dip it in only as far as you need to go. This is almost impossible when swimming unless you rest your housing on a raft or float.

#### **Keeping Your Dome Dry**

It is virtually impossible to submerge the bottom half of your dome port while keeping the top half dry. There are times when you are shallow enough to carry a micro fiber lens cloth and actually dry off the top half of your dome in-between shots. But a microfiber cloth will work against you once it gets drenched. I find a wet cloth will leave a million tiny droplets instead of the big ones that are easy to repair in the edit.

Another technique is called "dunk and shoot." You start by lining up your image. Then fully submerge the dome right before you want to take a photo, lifting or rotating it steadily back to the proper orientation for the shot. You should notice more "sheeting" and less droplets.



Get creative! When using the "dunk and shoot" technique to wipe your dome, shooting a burst can capture interesting refractions of the light and color as the water sheets down the dome.

#### **How to Prevent Water Droplets**

Spit is famous for defogging a mask, because it creates a thin film that is clear enough to see through. This natural "film" also helps your dome port shed water in a more uniform sheet. When the water line drops down like a curtain there will be less individual droplets to repair. So yes, some photographers spit on their domes. It's the most reliable (and least expensive) way to reduce water droplets on your dome.

If spit makes you squeamish, you can alternatively try a mild, eco-friendly shampoo or dish soap. But it will only work until the soap washes away — so work quickly and re-apply as needed.



It is tempting to look over the top of the housing and "shoot from the hip" but small changes in the tilt of the housing make big changes in your scene. It's always preferable to look through the lens when shooting split shots and the Straight Enhanced Magnifying Viewfinder can be a big help here.

I have found that polishing my dome before going in can also help. There are 3 levels of polish that are used for buffing out scratches on your port. NOVUS #3 is simply a plastic cleaner and polish. It won't remove scratches, but it will make your dome smoother (you can feel this with your hand). This will help the water shear off more cleanly.

Some shooters have reported good results with an acrylic friendly Rain-X product. But in our testing we found that it reduced sheeting of the water and created more individual droplets (as advertised). We're also not sure of the environmental impact or the possibility of chemical incompatibility with various o-ring compounds.



The worst thing that can happen is for your camera to focus on the droplets instead of the subject. Using a smaller aperture increases your depth-of-field and your chances that the subject will be in focus.

#### Water Droplets vs. Fog

Let's be clear that water droplets should always be on the outside of your dome port. Water droplets on the inside are a big problem and you should get your system out of the water immediately.

If you have fog on the inside of your dome, you have too much humidity inside. Make sure the housing is completely dry inside and assemble it in a climate controlled (air conditioned) room next time.

If you have fog on the outside of your dome, it's because of a large difference in the temperature inside compared to outside. This should go away pretty quickly once things become the same temperature.

#### **Removing Water Droplets in Editing**

Expect to do some editing on your split shots. Most are improved by some corrections to balance dynamic range between the upper and lower halves of the image. Use your editor's repair tools to carefully remove any obtrusive water spots.

Not all droplets are the same. If they are in your sky, cloning them out or using the repair tool will be very satisfying. If they cross your model's face there may be nothing you can do. However, editing tools are getting smarter and there are many content-aware and Al-based tools that may soon be able to save even the most pock-marked split shot.



One approach to water droplets is to shoot your "overs" separately and add them in Photoshop. This also solves the famous tonal range issue caused by the sky exposure.




